BIGFURK — Eva Gates, whose grandmother's recipe for homemade preserves was so popular that she formed a mail-order business with sales worldwide, died Friday afternoon at the Bigfork Convalescent Center. She was 94.

She and her husband, George, founded Eva Gates Homemade Preserves in 1949, when a strawberry patch she'd planted at the family's 80-acre farm near Bigfork grew too large for the needs of her family and friends.

While Mrs. Gates cooked fivepint batches on a wood-burning stove, her husband began selling her preserves locally at first. As demand grew, the product was distributed more widely, but she refused to cut corners to increase production. She said in a 1978 interview that her customers had in-

George Gates was offered a job in 1941 on Wake Island, a small and remote part of the Hawaiian Islands chain, and his wife returned to Butte when she was told she couldn't accompany him. Gates was there for less than a year when he was captured by the Japanese and held as a prisoner of war for 46 months.

Meanwhile, Mrs. Gates related, she came to the Flathead Valley in 1942 "out of desperation and to keep

my mind occupied."

After her husband came home in 1945, weighing 110 pounds less than he had when he was captured, they settled on 80 acres of land near Bigfork. Because her husband suffered permanent injuries from his imprisonment, Mrs. Gates did most of the land-clearing and building of

cluded former President Dwight D. Eisenhower.

The product was entered in a world trade fair in 1972 and was judged sixth-best — the only American entry to be honored, family members said. The business, which remains in the Gates family, continues to sell preserves and syrups both retail and wholesale a headquarters in downtown Bigfork.
