H. Dean Hart, 40, at one time a top official in the administration of former Gov. Thomas L. Judge and an assistant to former Sen. Majority Leader Mike Mansfield, died recently in Los Angeles.

He died of a heart attack in a hospital where he was being treated for pneumonia. He had suffered from cancer for a number of years.

Hart is well known by many persons in Glasgow when he worked to coordinate local, state and federal efforts to provide job opportunities at Glasgow Air Force Base.

Raised on a dude ranch owned by his family in Big Timber, Hart divided his time between the ranch and Martha's Vineyard in Massachusetts. He attended prep schools in the east and later enrolled at Montana State University, leaving college to work on Mansfield's Washington staff for three years.

At Mansfield's recommendation, Judge hired Hart as Montana's federal-state coordinator based in Washington, D.C., in 1973. Hart held that post until Judge left office in January 1981 and remained one of the former governor's closest advisors.

As federal-state coordinator, Hart was involved in efforts to promote international trade in Montana, to find a use for the abandoned Glasgow Air Force Base, to promote exchanges of agricultural exports with Saudi Arabia and to secure funding and support for the magnet-ohydrodynamics project in Butte.

One of Hart's last projects for Judge was working on the ultimately unsuccessful attempt to secure federal loans and guarantees for the state-sponsored financing to allow for the private purchase of the Milwaukee Railroad lines.

After Judge left office in 1981, Hart joined another Montanan and former Mansfield assistant, former Secretary of the U.S. Senate J. Stanley Kimmett, in the governmental affairs office of Hughes Helicopter Inc. in Arlington, Va.

Hart's last job was in Los Angeles as assistant to the president of Hughes Helicopter. He also worked for McDonnell-Douglas, which bought Hughes Helicopter last year.

He was on the board of directors for the Mansfield Center for International Affairs.


