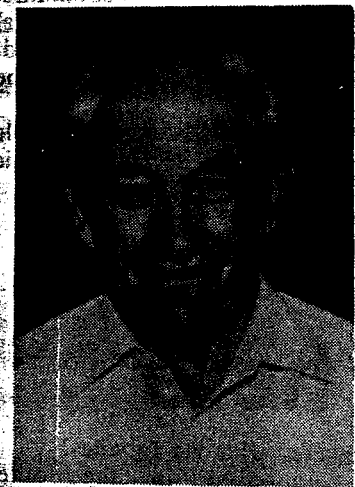
Music was provided by Cory Carlson, vocalist, and Irene Smith, organist.

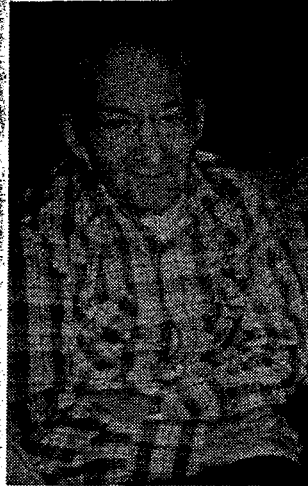
Kenneth A. Hallock of Glasgow died Sunday, March 16, in Frances Mahon Deaconess Hospital. 1986
