After the death of her husband in 1969, she moved to Connecticut to live with her daughter, Thelma. They moved back to Montana in 1976, and a year later she entered the Lutheran home.

Surviving are a son, Warren Herd, Kevin; a daughter, Thelma Roog, Kalispell; and many grandschildren.

The body has been forwarded by the Johnson Funeral Home to the Burns Funeral Home in Shelby, where services will be Tuesday at 11 a.m. Burial will be in Mountain View Cemetery there.
