

Hanna continued research and writing, and his last book published in 1986 was "The Life and Times of James Willard Schultz (Apikuni)" which was dedicated to the James Willard Schultz Society, and "to its loyal members who have long awaited this story of their hero."

Hanna was born at Defiance, Iowa July 20, 1898 with his family coming to North Dakota the following year. His father George W. Hanna was superintendent of schools at Valley City for 47 years and lived to be 95.

The University of North Dakota Foundation at Grand Forks paid tribute to Warren Hanna in its annual report published last month. Hanna was first president of the North Dakota Alumni Association and Foundation. In 1931-43 Hanna was worker's compensation judge for the California Industrial Accident Commission. As a sideline he began to edit and write books on California law, and his four volume work on compensation law became the authority in that state. He founded Hanna Legal Publications in 1936 and during his publishing years more than a half million books bearing his name reached the shelves of California bar and bench. He was senior partneremeritus in the law firm of Hanna, Brophy, Maclean, McAleer and Jensen founded in 1943 that now has offices in six California cities and more than 50 lawyers.
