Woman's death 'questionable,' sheriff says

POLSON (AP) — The weekend death of a Polson woman occurred under "questionable" circumstances and a coronor's jury will sort out the facts at an inquest, Lake County Sheriff Joe Geldrich said Monday.

Geldrich identified the victim as Leilani Aki, 28, originally from Hawaii and a Polson resident for the past year or so. The victim had earlier lived in Butte for several years and her family now lives in San Francisco, said Geldrich, who also is the county coroner.

The victim was dead at the scene after falling from a pickup truck into a roadside ditch at about 8:25 p.m. Saturday on Montana Highway 35, two miles east of Polson, authorities said.

"It's kind of a questionable death, really," Geldrich told The Associated Press, adding that authorities did not know why the woman had fallen out of the truck or whether she had been in the cab or the box of the pickup.

"We'll have an inquest as soon as we can," after results are available from an autopsy performed Monday, the sheriff said.
