Vinzenz 'Vince' Inderkum, 93

Vinzenz "Vince" Inderkum, 93, died in the Immanuel Lutheran Home on Sunday evening, Dec. 25.

He was born April 5, 1895, in Intschi, Switzerland, a son of Joseph Marie and Severina Walker Inderkum. He attended school and served in the



Swiss Army before coming to the United States.

He came to America on Jan. 23, 1923, through Ellis Island, Chicago, and Minneapolis, across the northern route through Montana and on to Sacramento, Calif., where he was employed milking cows for a large dairy farm.

He then moved north to the San Francisco area where he continued milking cows for a short period of time. Still not satisfied with this area, he decided to take his entire savings to buy a Model A Ford touring car and head for Montana, the area most like his homeland.

In the spring of 1928, Mr. Inderkum came to the Flathead Valley by way of Thompson Falls, where he worked on a ranch feeding and milking cattle for about six months. He continued to do ranch work until he sold his Model A and used the money and his earnings to buy his 160-acre ranch at Ashley Lake in the early summer of 1930.

He farmed there until September 1960, when he and his wife, Maude, sold the ranch and moved to a place along Highway 2, west of Kalispell.

His wife died there in March of 1964, and for the next 19 years he remained there until he moved to the Flathead County Nursing Home in October 1983.

In July 1988, he became a resident of the Immmanuel Lutheran Home where he resided until his death.

During his younger years he enjoyed hunting, berry picking, card games and working his ranch. He also made skis and sleds for his son, and made his own Swiss sausage.

He was grandpa, uncle and friend to all who knew him, and they will miss him.

He married Hazel Maude Monett Nelson on May 2, 1937, in Polson, and was preceded by her in death in 1964. He was also preceded in death by his parents; two sisters, Mary and Sephrine; seven brothers, Pete, Anton, Xaver, Joseph, Yost, Johan and Gallus, all in Switzerland, and a stepdaughter, Dorritt C. Hanson, in 1985.

He is now survived by one stepson, Chris E. Nelson, Spokane, Wash.; one nephew in America, John Inderkum of Bothel, Wash.; eight grandchildren, Mrs. Melvin (Cecil) Powell, and Carlene Moore, both of Kalispell, Melvin H. (Skip) Hanson of Roundup, Tena Nelson, Linda Tredor, Mrs. Melvin (Dee Dee) Freeman, and Cheri Roberts, all of Spokane, Wash., and Marie Hamil of Dover, Okla.; 23 greatgrandchildren; six great-great-grandchildren and numerous nieces and nephews in Switzerland.

Survivors include his wife, Addie; a son, Duwayne, Eureka; a stepdaughter; a stepson, Everett Scott, Eureka; and a sister.



Harry Isch dies on hike

Harry Isch, 69, a longtime Kalispell accountant, died Thursday afternoon of a heart attack while hiking in Glacier National Park.

A 10-member party had hiked to the Hidden Lake overlook at Logan Pass to climb Mount Cannon, said George Ostrom, one of the hikers. He said Isch complained of being dizzy. Dr. Harry Gibson checked and found Isch's pulse erratic.

Gibson, Pat Gyrion and Isch turned back and met a man from Gibson's office who took Isch's pack. Isch turned to thank the man for carrying his pack, then col-

A passing hiker located a ranger who radioed for ALERT. Three doctors and the ranger administered CPR without success.

Harry M. Isch, 69

Mr. Harry M. Isch, age 69, died of an apparent heart attack on Thursday afternoon while hiking in Glacier National Park.

He was born Sept. 7, 1918, in Kalispell, a son of Henry

and Anna Marie Isch. He had attended the Fairview Elementary School and was a graduate of the Flathead County High School in the class of 1936. He was then employed with Nash Finch Co. for five years, working first in Kalispell before being transferred to Speridan, Wyo.

On March 15, 1942, he entered the U.S. Army at Ft. Lewis, Wash., serving in the Asiatic Pacific Theater until receiving his honorable discharge on Oct. 24, 1945, at Ft.

Douglas, Utah.

He then returned to Kalispell, and in Jan. 1946, he entered the University of Montana, where he graduated in 1949 with a degree in Business Administration and Accounting. He was then employed with the Richards Accounting Service in Kalispell until 1951, when he established his own accounting business, which he has operated since that time.

He was a member of the Elks Lodge; Eagles Lodge;

Kalispell Masonic Lodge No. 152 A.F.&A.M.; Bagdad Shrine AAONMS of Butte; V.F.W. and National Society of Public Accountants. He had been active in band in high school and had enjoyed music, being an accomplished coronet player. He had sung in the Gleemens Chorus and the Barbershop Chorus. He enjoyed fishing and hiking and duplicate bridge.

He was preceded in death by his father, Henry Isch, on Jan. 11, 1986. On June 30, 1947, he was married to Flora Mae Bellefleur in the Bethlehem Lutheran Church in Kalispell and is now survived by her at the family home. He is also survived by two daughters, Stephanie Isch of Seattle. Wash., and Mrs. Dennis (Rita) McKinney of East Sound. Wash.; his mother, Anna Marie Isch at the Immanuel Lutheran Home; a brother, Burton Isch of Kalispell; a sister, Mrs. Stuart (June) Hughes of Missoula: two grandchildren, Nicole Marie and Boone Henry McKinney, and several other relatives.

Funeral services for Mr. Isch will be held at 11 a.m. on Monday in the Johnson Mortuary Chapel with the Rev. Howard Mars, pastor of the Bethlehem Lutheran Church officiating. Gremation will follow the services.
