Remains of lost guide found in South Fork

A year-long hunt ended May 18 when searchers recovered the remains of Ralph Frederick "Butch" Miles near Bunker Creek in the Flathead's South Fork.

Searchers in the area discovered Miles' vest in a slide area of a cliff several hundred yards above the creek canyon Tuesday. They contacted the Flathead County Sheriff's Office which dispatched the Flathead and North Valley Search and Rescue teams

About 15 searchers combed the area on top of the cliffs and soon found more bits of Miles' clothing. North Valley Search and Rescue coordinator Jack Thompson said many bones, including a jaw bone, were found.

"The remains were 100 yards along the game trails," he said. Undersheriff Gary Franklin said he believed the death was accidental.

Miles, 44, was working as a camp caretaker when he disappeared June 2, 1987, from Colin Hislop's backcountry camp near Gorge Creek in the Spotted Bear Ranger District. Some camp visitors who arrived that afternoon reported that food was thawing for an evening meal, but Miles never returned. They reported him missing that evening, but searchers had no luck finding him.

Miles' dog returned to camp seven days after the begining of the search,

but could not lead the searchers to his body. Most of the search activity concentrated along the Bunker Creek banks, because the canyon cliffs were believed too steep and difficult for Miles to climb, Thompson said. Searchers logged about 2,000 hours looking for him, he added.

Miles was born Sept. 28, 1942, in Coeur D' Alene, Idaho, a son of Robert and Ione Miles. He moved to Montana at a young age and attended school in Columbia Falls. He graduated from Columbia Falls High School in 1959.

He then moved to Alaska and worked as an outfitter-guide on Kodiak Island until 1964. He served in the U.S. Army in Vietnam and received an honorable discharge in 1966.

He worked for the Great Northern Railroad for several years. At the time of his death, he was an outfitter-guide in the Bob Marshall Wilderness.

He married Bonnie Lynn on May 23, 1982, in West Glacier. She survives him along with a brother, Robert of Whitefish; a sister, Joanne Rice of Spokane, Wash,; a niece, Nicole Miles; and a nephew, Dustin Miles, both of Whitefish.

Fire kills four in Kalispell

KALISPELL—Choking smoke killed four members of Roger Moore's family after a fire swept through their home the morning of Sept. 28.

Three-year-old Bradley Moore died soon after firemen removed him from the house. His sisters, Holly, 18 months, and Katie, 3 weeks, and mother Sherry, 24, were placed on life support systems at Kalispell Regional Hospital until Friday.

All showed no brain activity Friday and family members decided that morning to take them off life support systems. The two girls died immediately. Sherry died Saturday.

The family had recently moved to Kalispell from California. Roger Moore had lit a gas lantern Sept. 28 to help heat the house until its natural gas service could be turned on. He then left on job-hunting errands.

That lantern apparently warmed the wall it was alongside to flash point and

the fire began, according to fire officials. The fire produced a great deal of smoke and burned most of the oxygen out of the air. Sherry and her children were apparently just rising when the smoke overcame them. A neighbor spotted smoke coming from the house and called authorities. Firemen using breathing gear found the mother and children unconscious inside the house.

Concerned citizens have set up a benefit fund for Roger Moore through First Security Bank. Donors may mail contributions there or drop them off.

The tragedy has also inspired a drive to provide smoke alarms to anyone who needs them in Flathead County. Volunteers have raised more than \$3,000 in donations for purchasing detectors, which they plan to hand out free to anyone who asks. The number to call to request an alarm, donate to the cause or volunteer to help with the project is 257-7777.
