HELENA (AP) — The life of Alexander Grant Swaney, which came to its quiet end here last weekend, was the stuff of bad novels and made-for-television movies.

In his case, however, it happened to be true.

Swaney, the son of Montana pioneers, was a cavalry soldier and diplomat on three continents as a young man, but turned his back on the romance of it all, married and settled down to family life — only to see his wife, mother of their young daughter, die in an accident seven years later.

He lived out the rest of his long life quietly with his horses, antique furniture, books and photography in his home outside Helena. When Swaney died last Sunday, he was 92.

Tall and slim, elegant in his customary cowboy duds, he was a soft-spoken man of almost courtly manner. The snow-white hair and mustache that came with age only emphasized the lines of a classically handsome face.

Swaney seldom talked about his romantic past, may even have been unimpressed with it: He retired in 1961 after 34 years in the unromantic post of chief right-of-way agent for the Montana Highway Department.

He was born Nov. 24, 1896, in Kalispell, son of a Flathead Valley pioneer family, Andrew Walton Swaney and Mary Parthenia Foy.

At 17 he enlisted in Company F of the 2nd Montana Infantry. He served in Butte during the mining riots of 1914 and in New Mexico in 1916, assigned to the cavalry to patrol the border against Pancho Villa's raiders during the Mexican Revolution.

He served in France during 1917, and 1918 and was discharged at the age of 21 with the rank of captain.

Swaney returned to Kalispell and worked at a variety of jobs, then entered the University of Montana to study law and journalism. He also was editor of the campus newspaper. It was years later, however, while he worked for the Highway Department, that he completed his formal education and passed the state bar exam.

In 1920 he applied for a job in the State Department and was sent to Edinburgh, Scotland, as vice consul.

After two years he was assigned to China.

An avid horseman, he raced Mongolian ponies in China during the reign of the warlords and supervised the evacuation of 500 missionaries from his district during that country's upheavals.

He returned to the United States and Kalispell in 1927, but moved to Helena late that year to begin work with the Highway Department.

Swaney and Mildren Buckneberg, who taught English at Helena Senior High School, were married in 1940. She was fatally injured seven years later in a horseback riding accident.

Swaney's survivors include his daughter, Alexandra Mary of Jefferson City.
