BROWNING (AP) Mary Ground, an elder of the Blackfeet Indian Tribe whose life spanned the disappearance of the buffalo from the plains to the space age, has died at the age of 107.

Ground, who had 14 children and 475 grandchildren and descendants of grandchildren, died at a hospital

here on Wednesday.

She was born in 1882 in the Belly River Country of the Canadian province of Alberta and came to Montana as a small child.

She attended school on the Blackfeet Reservation and was fluent in both the Blackfeet language and English, but recalled that children were punished if they spoke Blackfeet in school.

In her teens, she was matched to wed a stranger, John Ground. They were married from Aug. 12, 1899 until Ground died in 1951.

The Grounds lived on a ranch in

the Starr School area and were among the Blackfeet who worked for the Great Northern Railway and greeted tourists at Glacier National Park in the summers.

After her husband's death, she moved into Browning, where she was active in cultural affairs, was an advocate of education for reservation youth, and was awarded an honorary degree from Blackfeet Community College in 1986.

She wrote "Grass Woman Stories" for the Browning school district's heritage program. "Grass Woman" was her Indian name, and the 14 stories in the book were about events she had heard about or participated in as a child.

Rosary is scheduled Sunday evening in the Eagle Shield Center, with funeral services Monday in the Little Flower Parish, followed by burial in the Catholic cemetery in Browning.
