Scott Young, 44, and Evelyn McPheeters Young, 38, Kalispell, died Aug. 19 in an airplane crash at Kalispell City Airport.

Mr. Young was born Oct. 14, 1945, at Kalispell, son of Ross and Delores Young. He was reared in Kalispell, graduating from Flathead High School in 1964. He later attended the University of Montana and Spokane Community College.

A musician, he worked for McIntosh Music in Kalispell and later ran a recording studio in Seattle. In 1966, he married Kitty Garrett in Kalispell. They later divorced.

He returned to Kalispell in 1971 and worked for Flathead Beverage Co. since. He eventually became president and owner.

Mrs. Young was born April 9, 1952, at Osaka, Japan, daughter of Willard and Fusako McPheeters. She was about 18 months old when her family moved to Kalispell. She graduated from Flathead High School in 1970 and went on to earn a B.A. degree in Elementary Education at Montana State University.

Since graduating from MSU, she taught in several Montana school systems and spent the past 10 years in the Evergreen Schools.

The couple was married in November of 1985 in Kalispell and lived in the Kalispell area since.

Surviving family members include daughters, Angela M. Young and Heidi Jo Young, both of Kalispell; mothers, Fusako McPheeters and Delores Young, both of Kalispell; grandparents, Willard and Bernice McPheeters of Kalispell; Mr. Young's sisters, Kris Young of Spokane and Roz Agnew of Missoula; Mrs. Young's sisters, Kimberlee Otto of Federal Way, Wash., and Gail McPheeters of Troy, Mich., and numerous other relatives and friends.

Mrs. Young was preceded in death by her father; Mr. Young by his father and two brothers, David and Daniel.

Memorial services were Aug. 22 at the Kalispell Elks Lodge with Rev. Paul Taylor officiating. Private urn burial took place at C.E. Conrad Memorial Cemetery under the direction of Weatherford Funeral Home & Crematory.

**Hazel Wagner Young**



HAZEL WAGNER YOUNG was born Oct. 23, 1898, in Cloud County, Kansas. She was the 7th of 10 children. When she was 4, her family moved to what is now Colorado Springs, and her father worked at the Bethlehem gold smelter. Hazel received her schooling in Ordway, Co., where her family raised fruit and her father shipped cantaloupes and watermelons. When she was a young woman, the family moved to Grand Junction. On Feb. 5, 1916, Hazel married Fred Young, who worked on the Gunnison Dam with her father. During World War 1, Fred & Hazel moved to Sheridan, Wy, where coal miners were needed for the war effort. They homesteaded in nearby Decker, Mt. In 1925, they moved to Lodge Grass, Mt. on the Crow Indian Reservation. They saw many people leave the

state because of crop failure due to drought and crickets. Fred often brought travelers home for food and lodging. During World War 11 the Youngs lived near Great Falls and Fred worked in a lead mine. In 1943, Fred & Hazel moved to Kalispell. Fred worked at the Flathead Mine, operated a small sawmill, and retired as a scaler at Stoltz Lumber Co. He died in March, 1978. The Youngs raised 10 children: Ardeanah Nabor, Kent, WA; Louise Klos & Joe Young, Thermopolis, WY; Fred Charles, Young, Cottage Grove Ore; Madeline Coleman, Atlanta, Ga; Dollean Lind, Hardin, Mt.; Arthur Young, Hardin, Mt.; Jacqueline Plympton, Wesley and Gary Young, all of Kalispell. Hazel has 40 grandchildren and over 65 great and great-great grandchildren. Hazel served as a mid-wife in Lodge Grass and always kept her home open to needy people. She was chaplain of the Salvation Army Home League in Kalispell, for over 30 years and helped establish the Salvation Army Thrift Store in Kalispell. Hazel enjoys reading and music. She moved to Immanuel from Colonial Manor, on Feb. 12, 1988.
