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

After graduation from high school, she studied for a year at Miss Wheelock's Teachers College in Boston. She received her teacher's certificate from Colorado Teachers College at Greeley, then returned to Salida to teach elementary school.

In 1915, she married George Gary Griswold, Jr., a 1914 graduate of the Colorado School of Mines at Golden. They spent their honeymoon on the train to Butte, where he was employed as metallurgist at Timber Butte Mill, owned by "copper king" W. A. Clark. Their three children were born in Butte and Ruth was to be a resident of "the greatest mining camp on earth" for the next 70 years.

Because of her previous frail health, the family physician recommended going to a lower climate from Butte's mile-high elevation for part of each year. So in 1921, Ruth and her children spent the summer at Flathead Lake, travelling by train from Butte to Polson, then up-lake on the paddle-wheel steamer "Klondike" to Table Bay. For the next 18 years they spent almost every summer in the idyllic setting of the Flathead, always with horses, for Ruth loved horses and loved to ride.

During the early 1920s, her husband researched, developed, and patented unique flotation processes for separating complex minerals from their ores. His inventions advanced the mining world's processes for recovering minerals such as copper, lead, zinc, and gold to a new era. In 1932, he established his neadquarters and opened his own aboratory in Butte, becoming an independent consulting metallurgist. He soon became Montana's

best-known mining engineer.

During his long career, her husband's contributions to the field of metallurgical engineering had a great impact on the development of Montana's and the nation's mineral resources. His flotation discoveries resulted in the profitable mining of previously unmarketable ore bodies. Many mining communities throughout the world owed their existence to his scientific abilities.

Caring for her family and maintaining a happy home for her husband were Ruth's top priorities. She also enjoyed bird-watching, wild-flowers, horseback riding, camping, hiking, reading and writing, exploring Montana's back-country roads and abandoned mining camps with family and friends, visiting museums and historic sites, and travelling

She was active in the Women's Auxiliary of the American and Montana Institute of Mining Engineers, in the Delphians, in the literary Homer Club, and in Episcopal church activities. She served as a docent at Butte's historic "Chateau" and was one of the founders of the World Museum of Mining there.

In later years, Ruth accompanied her husband on numerous trips to Alaska, Mexico, Canada, Nevada, and California, where he designed and built mills for the recovery of precious metals. After his death in 1962, she continued to travel to Italy and Greece, to England, France, Belgium, and Germany, Canada, South America, and to various parts of the U.S. In her 80s, she took a trip around the world.

In 1984, her son and family returned to Flathead Lake to stay. Later that year, she moved to Kalispell to be near them, and in her twilight years to enjoy again the scenic beauties of the Flathead Valley.

Always with deep faith in God's inspired word, for the past seven years she has been associated with the Woodland Park Congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses.

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
