He later was transferred to Seneca Rocks in Pendleton County where he served as an instructor in rock climbing.

As a staff sergeant in Company F 87th Mountain Infantry, 10 Mountain Division, he participated during the Italian Campaign in 1945, in the battles of Vidiciatico, Mont Belvedere-Riva Ridge, Mont Della Vedetta, Mont Della Piella, Tarre Tussi, Mosca Ridge and Mont

Serra "Bloody Ridge" where he lost his right arm. In the Battle of Mont Serra, after his company took an elaborate fortification stone house and as he was preparing to toss a hand grenade, his right arm was struck by machine gun fire. Lying behind a stone wall, he located the pressure points above the wounds and held them with his other hand for several hours until he was joined by a buddy who removed his arm with a knife and dragged him to safety on a blanket.

Dalen was awarded two Purple Hearts and the Bronze

Star.

Though handicapped, Mr. Dalen worked many years as a ski instructor at The Big Mountain and as an assistant director of the Sepp Kober Ski School at the Homestead at Hot Springs, Va. He also became a proficient carpenter and furniture maker and he operated a live stock farm.

On May 6, 1946, he married Mary Curry Dyer, who survives at Franklin.

Also surviving are one daughter, Andrea Larrivee of Makarora, New Zealand; one son, John Dalen of Franklin; three sisters, Arlene Field and Minnie Pike, both of Whitefish, and Mary Collier of Coulee Dam, Wash.; one brother, Harold Dalen of Whitefish; and two grandchildren.


During his 30 years as a dairy farmer, he served as president of the
