

MISSOULA (AP) - Marguerite V. Hood, a former music director for the state of Montana and an international authority on music education, has died in Pomona, Calif., at the age of 88.

Fascinated by the possibility of using radio to reach remote schools in Montana, Miss Hood studied radio techniques at New York University and taught early radio courses at the University of Montana in Missoula.
