GLACIER NATIONAL PARK (AP) - The bodies of an Alberta couple killed in a plane crash in Glacier National Park were recovered Thursday afternoon, a park spokes-

woman said.

"Two rangers were flown into the scene of the crash at Logan Pass at mid-morning," said park spokeswoman Amy Vanderbilt.

"The bodies were removed from the scene via helicopter," she said.

Willard Smith, 57, and his wife Marion, 54, were killed Wednesday when their four-passenger plane nosed into deep snow near the Logan Pass visitor center on the Continental Divide.

The visitor center is crowded in summer, but now is inaccessible from the ground because of deep

The couple was on their way from their home in Lamcombe, Alberta, to Kalispell when their plane went down.

Canadian military parachutists who were dropped at the crash site late Wednesday confirmed that both people aboard the plane were dead.

Investigators from the National Transportation Safety Board and the Federal Aviation Administration officials were looking into the crash, she said.

No decision has been made on whether to try to remove the aircraft from the site, where snow is estimated to be 20 feet deep, Vanderbilt

The last air fatality in the park occurred in September 1985, also near Logan Pass. That crash took the life of a Canadian pilot and his mother, while the pilot's wife and father survived.
