He introduced many people, young and old, to the joys of skiing from the early "hike from town" days of the Hell Roaring Ski Club to his school retirement years as a ski instructor for his former student, Martin Hale. Mully's philosophy on teaching, whether it was skiing or education, was to "reinforce the positive feelings" and have the "lesson as an ego strengthener for the learner."

When Mully talked of skiing, he often said, "It's a tremendous thrill to come up over the top of the mountain and ski down. Looking back, you see the track and you know you've been there."

In 1938, Mully was one of the people responsible for the first Montana State Championship Interscholastic Junior Ski Meet and it was held on The Big Mountain.

Also, in the 1930s, he was with a party which was the second ever to climb Mount St. Nicholas in Glacier National Park.

He was born in Toaterville, Iowa, on April 22, 1906, to Anna Erickson Muldown and Benjamin Muldown. Mully grew up in Lyle, Minn., and graduated from Lyle High School in 1923. He earned a bachelor's degree in philosophy from Hamline University in St. Paul, Minn., in 1927 and a master's degree in physics from the University of Wyoming in Laramie in 1960.

During his lifetime, Mully received many honors from the community he felt so close to for 65 years. Mully's Mile on The Big Mountain bears his name. He was elected to the Whitefish Lake Golf Course hall of fame. The Whitefish Chamber of Commerce and the Whitefish Jaycees recognized him for his outstanding service to the community. In 1988, the Montana Coaches Association inducted him into their hall of fame. In 1974, the new elementary school was renamed Muldown School.
