Francis T. "F.T." O'Boyle

Francis T. "F.T." O'Boyle, 77, died at his home in Kalispell on Monday, July 25, after a heart attack. Known throughout the Valley as: "F.T."; "Curly"; "Frank"; and, of course, "Dad". O'Boyle was born Jan. 18, 1917 on a 160-acre homestead northwest of what is now downtown Kalispell. A tireless worker, both at his residence, 665 2nd Ave. E.N., and his lifelong parish home, St. Matthew's. O'Boyle was well known and well-loved not only as a husband and father, but also as a citizen, family man, parishioner and civic leader.

O'Boyle opinions and advice, well after his last term on the Kalispell City Council in 1984, were actively sought, not only by those in current leadership positions, but also by both those who had served and aspired to serve in elected positions. He had made many trips to Helena, serving as an advocate and representing Kalispell's interests. O'Boyle, lauded by former Mayor, Norma Happ, as being a city councilman who always weighed each problem and did his homework" was a firm believer in participatory democracy and the practice of governmental ethics, with no favoritism shown to special interests.

His colleagues and constituents respected him for being down-to-earth and with open-minded concerns, and he was not afraid to champion activist causes. For example, he spearheaded the effort to save the Old City Hall Building on 3rd St., while the new City Hall was being constructed. His beloved St. Matthew's Church benefited from his many fundraising activities, including the installation of a concrete handicapped access ramp, playground renovation and stained glass window restoration.

The son of pioneer settlers and Irish immigrants, James and Mary O'Boyle, "F.T." was seven of eight children.

"F.T.", reflecting on his Irish heritage, was quoted in the 1985 St. Patrick's Day issue of the Daily Inter Lake: "We had the old-time party telephone lines, and when we'd hear the neighbors speaking Norwegian, we'd never know if they were talking about us Irish or the crops. O'Boyle, true to his agrarian upbringing, developed a Custom Tree Service and was widely recognized for his artistic pruning and gardening efforts. He was also a school bus contractor, and had served on the Board of Directors for the Montana School Bus Contractor's Association. A WW II veteran as a high-speed radio operator, he served under Gen. George S. Patton and had been awarded five service medals.

"F.T." and Rachel had travelled to Asheville, N.C., Atlanta, Ga., and Midland, Mich., for reunions with his fellow service buddies of the 552 Signal Air Warning Battalion.

He is survived by his brother, Walter Alexander of Klamath Falls, Ore.; his wife, Rachel of Kalispell; four sons, Patrick, Daniel, Terry and Dennis; and

nine grandchildren.
