Gillett G. Griswold, 77

Gillett G. Griswold, 77, of Lakeside, died at the Kalispell Regional Hospital on Thursday, June 15, 1995.

He was born Dec. 15, 1917, in Butte, to George Gary Griswold Jr., a mining engineer, and Ruth Whitehurst Griswold. He grew up in Butte and the Flathead Lake area, attending Butte schools. He also attended the Governor Dummer Academy, Newburyport, Mass.; Stanford University and the University of Montana in Missoula, where he received his bachelor's degree with honors in 1953 and his master's degree in anthropology in 1954.

His master's thesis, "Aboriginal Patterns of Trade Between the Columbia Basin and Northern Plains" was later published and is now used widely in research work.

In 1942, he entered the Army in Butte and served in the Historical Section, U.S. Forces, European Theater in World War II, attached to the Third Army in 1944, Fifteenth Army in 1945 and the Army of Occupation in Germany from 1945-50.

After his graduation from the University of Montana, he became curator, then director, of the U.S. Army Field Artillery Museum at Fort Sill, Okla., from 1954 until retiring in 1979. During that time, he built the museum from a few old cannons and one building, the Geronimo Guard-



house, into the Army's largest museum.

He became the foremost living authority on Fort Sill history, an authority on the history of American Artillery, the American West and the

American Indians; a liaison between civilian and military communities and Fort Sill's official friend of the Indians. The museum in those 25 years more than quadrupled its acquisitions, and the collection is valued at \$12 million. It includes a vast array of materials.

In 1957, he planned and coordinated the reburial rites at the Post Cemetery for Comanche Chief Quannah Parker and his white captive mother, Cynthia Ann; and in 1958, "Hunting Horse Day and the dedication of Old Stone Corral. There followed the identification and permanent marking of 300 Apache prisoner-of-war graves on the east range, a project that took three years and involved hundreds of interviews with the oldest members of the tribe. He compiled a lengthy study on the Fort Sill Apaches and their genealogies that is used by the government for vital statistics. He was accorded hon-

orary membership in the Chiricahua/Fort Sill Apache Tribe, the Kiowa Tribe and the Comanche Tribe. He was elected a fellow of the Company of Military Historians and Honorary Lt. Gov. of Oklahoma. He was a member of Toastmasters, and had many speaking awards.

In 1984, he moved to Angel Point on Flathead Lake, where he lived ever since.

On Dec. 15, 1945, he married Elza DeVriese, in Frankfurt, Germany. He is survived by her at their home in Lakeside.

He is also survived by a daughter, Lizette Griswold Bagdadi, of Denver, Colo., son Gary Griswold, of Lawton, Okla., sisters Jane Griswold Smith, of Monument, Colo. and Phoebe Griswold Holzman, of Pearce, Ariz.

A memorial service will be 2 p.m., Monday, at Kingdom Hall of the Jehovah's Witnesses, 1414 Woodland Ave., with Harvey J. Hawkins officiating. Graveside services and urn burial will be at 2:30 p.m., Tuesday, at Mountain View Cemetery, in Butte.

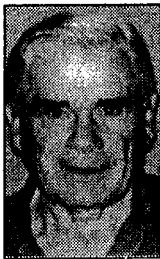
Paul A. Grosswiler, 76
