Bob was the epitome of the hard-working, self-employed, blue-collar small businessman who are the backbone of this country.

He married Dorothy Alice Pomeroy in 1941. They celebrated their 53rd anniversary on Oct. 8, 1994. They were truly one flesh, always sharing equally the hardships and triumphs in their marriage. Bob was a devoted family man and pet lover.

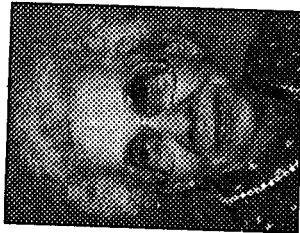

She was preceded in death by her husband, Henry Marken, on March 30, 1982; two brothers, Clyde Yenne and Bill Yenne; and a granddaughter,

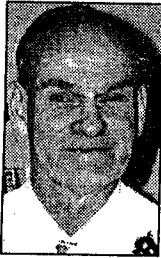
