





1996 Dr. Jessie Bierman, 96

A distinguished international medical leader and an early and constant supporter of the Flathead Lake Biological Station, Dr. Jessie Bierman, died Aug. 26 at her home in Carmel, Calif. She was 96.

She was born at Egan Slough near Kalispell on April 6, 1900.

At 21, she was one of the first women to study field ecology at the biological station of the University of Montana with the station's founder and director, Dr. Morton Elrod. She often referred to her study there as influential and formative in her scientific career.

She earned her biology degree from the University of Montana in 1920 and attended the University of Chicago's Rush Medical College. She interned in pediatrics in San Francisco and earned her medical degree in 1927. She practiced and taught in pediatrics at the University of California School of Medicine.

She returned to Montana during the Great Depression. She founded model well-baby clinics in county health departments with New Deal funding.

In 1937, she joined the children's bureau in the Department of Labor in Washington, D.C., as assistant director of health. She earned a degree in public health administration at Columbia University and moved to California to head maternal and child health activities for the health department. She established a department of maternal and child health in the School of Public Health at the University of California

nia-Berkeley, where she was a professor.

She traveled to Germany and Hawaii for studies. After leaving Berkeley in 1967, she headed the maternal and child health bureau for the World Health Organization in Geneva, Switzerland, and also worked with the National Academy of Sciences, the U.S. Army, and various government missions.

She received the Martha May Eliot Award of the American Public Health Association for her work. The Montana Medical Association named her one of five distinguished women physicians. She was also named a Distinguished Alumna by the University of Montana and received an honorary degree. In 1993, she received the Ludwig Browman Award from the university's Maureen and Mike Mansfield Library.

She often visited Montana, where she loved to hunt and fish in Flathead Lake. She maintained a summer residence at Goose Bay.

She helped fund housing, student fellowships and scientific equipment at the biological station on Yellow Bay. In 1986, she endowed the distinguished professorship for an internationally recognized biologist to work there. It is held by Dr. Jack A. Stanford.
