tionists to restore grizzly bears to central Idaho and western Montana while maintaining timber-harvest opportunities. He initiated similar consensus-based timber/wildlife projects on several national forests in Montana and Idaho.

He will be remembered and cherished for his positive energy, his constant cheer, his intense dedication

and his sharp intellect.

He was born in Philadelphia, Pa., on Aug. 18, 1961. He grew up and attended schools on Long Island, N.Y., and graduated from high school in Oak Park, Ill., as a National Merit Scholar. He received his bachelor's degree in anthropology from Duke University Summa cum laude. While at Duke, he organized the first Native American speakers conference.
