Ivan Ibsen, 84


Ivan Ibsen, 84, died at North Val-Hospital Extended Care on Sunday, July 28.

He loved his family and friends and particularly enjoyed cooking a meal for guests. He was a hospitable man who enjoyed company, dancing




He took pleasure in his garden and helping Darlene "put up" food and smoking the fish that generous fishermen dropped off.

A memorial service will be held at 11 a.m. Saturday at Christ Lutheran Church. The family requests donations to the charity of your choice.




"Judy" Julia Inman, 71, died Friday, Sept. 20, 1996. at Brendan House in Kalispell.
