He opened Park Ave. Records in Seattle in 1981, and managed and recorded the Seattle girl rock group, The Visible Targets.

In the mid-'80s, he branched out to Japan, where he was a partner in Golden Triangle Productions, often traveling to accompany his artists on concert tours. The company recorded Robbie Dupree, Bill Labounty, and Orleans in the U.S. for release by major labels in Japan. Golden Triangle also licensed many recordings for



Japanese release, including those by Maria Muldar, Amos Garrett and John Sebastian.

In the 1990's, Bob immersed himself in the acquisition and sales of rare vintage

guitars, an activity which gave him great pleasure after cancer forced him to close the Park Ave. Records store. The store was by then a Seattle musical landmark and is greatly missed by friends and visitors from around the world. His wide reputation for knowledge and integrity continued in the international collector's community when he shifted to guitars exclusively.
