Verne A. Hansen, 75

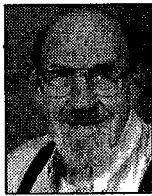
Verne A. Hansen, 75, a former Kalispell resident, died at his home in Sutherlin, Ore., on May 28, 1999.

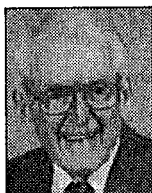
