He returned in 1945 and later retired from the Marine Corps at the rank of colonel.

In 1946, he moved to Butte and sold Caterpillar earth moving equipment. He was promoted to branch manager and in 1947 opened Westmont Tractor in Kalispell, where he worked with what he termed "some of the finest people in the Pacific Northwest,' building the Hungry Horse dam, the railroad and highway systems,

and logging the forests of Montana. He developed close and lasting relationships with many men and women of which he never tired of telling stories.

He retired from Westmont in 1978 but remained active by participating in city government where he sat on the mayor's committee to guide the transition to the city manager format. He helped actively seek qualified candidates for City Council and served as a campaign manager for a candidate seeking state office. He also had. for a time, his own radio talk show.

He dedicated much of his retirement life as a founder and fundraiser for A.L.E.R.T., the helicopter rescue and air ambulance service that Kalispell and Northwestern Montana are privileged to have today. He also supported and assisted the United Way of

Kalispell.

He is survived by his wife CB at the Lutheran Home, his son, Jeffrey A. Hurst and daughter-in-law Joanne of Tahoe City, and his grandchildren, Mary and Andrew of San Francisco and Sacramento, Calif.

A memorial service is planned for Thursday at 5 p.m. at the Buffalo Hill Funeral Home with a

reception to follow.
