Allan G. Quick, 87

Allan G. Quick, 87, of Columbia Falls, lost his battle with cancer on Nov. 2, 2001.

He was born in Mill Creek, near Anaconda, on May 3, 1914, to Alexander E. and Edna H. Quick. He graduated from Anaconda High School in 1933.

He worked for the CCC's for two years and then attended Butte Business College from 1939 to 1941. He was drafted for the U.S. Army on Feb. 27, 1941, and went through the Normandy Landing and seven campaigns in Europe with the 83rd Infantry Division ending with the Battle of the Bulge.

After being discharged, he returned to Anaconda and re-entered Butte Business College where he met Dorothy Brown. They were married on Nov. 24, 1947, at St. John's Episcopal Church in Butte.

He was recalled for service during the Korean War and stationed at Fort Lewis, Wash., for a year before returning to Anaconda where he worked at Miller Motors and then Victor Chemical and the Rocker Mill near Butte. In 1955, he came to Columbia Falls to work as a metallurgical accountant at the Anaconda Aluminum Plant.

He was a member of the Anaconda branch of the American Legion for over 50 years. His main interest was in antique cars and he was a long time member of the Flathead Pioneer Auto Club and the Montana Pioneer & Classic Auto Club. He also enjoyed dancing and was a member of the Columbia Falls Fast'n'ers Square Dance Club and the Flathead Round Dancers for many years.

He served as treasurer at the United Methodist Church for a



number of years and more recently for the Anaconda/Arco Retirees Club.

After his retirement in 1979, he would spend several weeks each year with his brother, Sam, in Tucson, Ariz., where they enjoyed working on Sam's old cars and attending swap meets.

He took great pride in his children and grandchildren.
