Harriet E. Fall, 91, died in her sleep at the Immanuel Lutheran Home in Kalispell, on Sept. 10, 2002.

Harriet was born in Cartwright, N.D., on June 27, 1911.

Her parents were homesteaders, although her father had a law degree from the University of Wisconsin. She spent her early childhood in North Dakota with her twin sister, Helen, and her two other sisters, Ruth and Martha. After her mother died she moved to Minneapolis, where her father continued to farm. After school she became a registered nurse and moved to Sidney, where she married Homer Sherlock, a restaurant owner.

Harriet and Homer raised five boys and moved their motel/hotel restaurant business from Sidney to Malta, Great Falls, and Coulee Dam, Wash. After Homer died in 1956, Harriet returned to Helena to be close to her twin sister and her family.

She married Judge Victor Fall in 1959. They enjoyed traveling the world and went to Africa, Australia, India, Italy, and Hawaii. Shortly after Victor retired they moved to Kalispell in 1976.

Harriet received great joy from her family and friends, cooking, gardening, playing bridge, sewing, and playing tennis. She loved entertaining and hosting parties



and dinners and had a gift for making people feel at home wherever she was. She was a friend to all she met, be they a governor or a gardener.

She served as a volunteer for Red Cross blood donations and other charities. Harriet was very proud to be involved in the Montana Centennial Train project in the mid-1960s.

After Victor died in 1985, she moved into Buffalo Hill Terrace as one of the first residents and was active at the Northridge Lutheran Church.

He was a 4-H leader for 21 years; livestock superintendent for the Northwest Montana Fair for more than 15 years; honorary member of the Flathead chapter of FFA; and was a Boy Scout leader for seven years. He was a state master of the Montana State Grange, priest archon for the National Order of Patrons of Husbandry; master of Stillwater Grange, as well as serving in various other Grange positions at the



local, state and national levels.

He will long be remembered by his family and friends for his "home-grown" pancakes at family get-togethers and Grange dinners. He was instrumental in the organization of the West Valley Volunteer Fire Department and served as chief as well as a member of the board of directors. He was a very active, lifelong member of the Epworth United Methodist Church.

He enjoyed fishing, hunting, camping and spending time with his family. His grandchildren enjoyed the stories he told around the campfire. He also enjoyed being an active part of the community and volunteered many hours toward that end. His strong spirit will live on in all that knew him.
