Pauline "Polly" Ottenbacher, 87, of Billings passed away on Thursday, May 30, 2002, at Parkview Care Center.


Polly was born on June 16, 1914,

Patrick J. Owens, 72

Patrick J. Owens, 72, died Feb. 22, 2002, at Kalispell Regional Medical Center after a long battle with complications caused by a stroke.

Patrick was born Aug. 5, 1929, in Libby, to James and Rachel (Williams) Owens.

He married Ruth Marvin in 1957, and they had one son, James Patrick, in 1959.

Patrick learned of a love for writing early, first working on the school newspaper at Flathead County High School, and then for the Daily Inter Lake and Missoulian before graduation in 1947. He served with the U.S. Army from 1948-51 as the editor of the Caribbean Army News and a public relations man.

Patrick's journalism career started out in smalltown Montana but soon brought him into the center of some of the hottest issues in the nation. In 1959, he moved to Little Rock, Ark., to work for the Arkansas Gazette and covered the desegregation in Little Rock schools and the national civil rights movement.

He then went on to Pine Bluff, Ark., to work for the Pine Bluff Commercial as a reporter and editorial writer covering desegregation in this Arkansas Black Belt community. Through his editorials, Patrick set out to change the town's point of view about desegregation.

His work in Arkansas brought him into the national spotlight and in 1965, Patrick moved on to Detroit and the Detroit Free Press, where he covered labor relations and such things as Jimmy Hoffa's leadership of the Teamsters.

In 1969, he joined the staff of Newsday in Long Island, N.Y., where he was part of their editorial staff, covering issues like the Nixon impeachment hearings and the Vietnam War. He spent time in Washington as a White House correspondent and in Europe report-

ing on the Warsaw Block and communist government.

In 1986, Patrick suffered a debilitating stroke, which ended his career early. He returned to Kalispell to be near his family.

Through Patrick's journalism, he championed the causes of real people who were struggling. He was strong willed and never afraid to state his opinions and stand up for what he felt was right. He wrote what he believed and not what he thought was popular. For this he was often unpopular with his editors.

He was awarded some of journalism's highest awards, including two Sidney Hillman awards and a Distinguished Reporting Citation.

While pursing his career in journalism, Patrick was a Neiman Fellow at Harvard University. In 1978, he received his master's degree of social work from the State University of New York at Stony Brook.

Patrick will not only be remembered for his talent as a writer and reporter but also for his brilliant mind and eccentric taste.

He was preceded in death by his father James Owens; mother, Rachel (Williams) Owens; stepfather, Orville Hoover; and sister, Linda Marie Hoover.

He is survived by his son, James, daughter-in-law Mary Ann, and granddaughters, Hope and Kaitlin of Park City, Utah; his sisters, Dorothy Pennoyer and Shirley Druesdow of Kalispell; brothers, Denny Owens of Marion, Gaylon Owens of Kalispell, and Mike Hoover of Rexford.

The family is grateful to all who helped care for Patrick during the years after his stroke. At his request, a cremation has taken place and a memorial service will be held in the spring.
