



His father died unexpectedly in 1947 and left Baird the Meredosia Grain Elevator, which he owned and operated until 1963, when he leased it to Central Soya. During this period he doubled the storage capacity of the elevator and built one of the first barge loading facilities on the Illinois River. He sold the Meredosia Elevator to Cargill in January 1978.

He built a fertilizer plant in 1954 and managed the fertilizer blending, retail sales and wholesale brokering until his retirement

in 1999. He put a lot of effort into establishing research plots to test various varieties of corn and soybeans with different seeding rates and fertilizer applications suited to local growing conditions in an effort to increase production for local farmers. Baird was known throughout the industry for his honesty and integrity.

In 1958, Baird and Esther bought a homestead above Polebridge in the North Fork of the Flathead. This property became a focal point in the family's life, with summers spent building cabins and workshops, floating the river and fishing. The time spent in Montana during the summer with family more than made up for the time Baird had to spend at the office in the busy spring and fall fertilizer seasons.

Baird and Esther also traveled extensively in the Southwest in later years, enjoying visits to museums and galleries displaying American Indian artifacts, art, jewelry, pottery and Navajo rugs.

Baird was active in many organizations, including the Masonic Lodge, Lions Club, Cub Scouts and the Meredosia Fire District. He belonged to a number of professional organizations, including the Illinois Grain Dealers Association and the Fertilizer Institute, and he was a certified Illinois Fertilizer Dealer.

He was president of the Meredosia School Board, bank director and chairman of the board at Farmers and Traders State Bank in Meredosia, and served on the Passavant Hospital Board in Jacksonville and the fund raising committees for the hospital and Illinois College. He was a director for the North Fork Improvement Association and was an organizer and charter member of the North Fork Compact, a 1960s effort at voluntary land use conservation by private property owners in the North Fork.

Baird is survived by his wife of 55 years, Esther Chrisman of Kalispell; a sister, Garnett Chrisman of Polson and Hope, Ariz.; a daughter, Kari Wiley, and her husband Tim, of Kalispell; a son, Allen Chrisman, and his wife Charlotte, of Bonners Ferry, Idaho; grandchildren Baird and Mark, also of Bonners Ferry, and Rachel and Eric Larson of Pleasant Plains, Ill.; nephew Bruce Larson and his wife, Adelle, of Pleasant Plains, Ill.; and numerous nieces and nephews.

Clarence E. Clapper, 73


Clarence E. Clapper, 73, formerly of Kalispell, passed away at his home on Sept. 24, 2003, in Charlo.


