


Eric Altenburg, 95, died at Community Hospital in Monterey, Calif., on Dec. 18, 2004.

Ralph Grant Atlee, 67, died of a sudden heart attack on Feb. 29, 2004.


He was born on March 8, 1936, in Victoria, British Columbia. He
