The last 10 years of her life, Joyce lived in wonderful group home settings, operated by the Missoula Developmental Service Corporation, where she was dearly cared for. She made many friends there who will miss her very much. She was a brave lady and loved her Lord. One of her life long wishes was to be a bride, and her wish was granted by her family who gave her a gift of a wedding and she married "Jesus in prepa-

ration for her return home."

She loved to paint, sing (she knew the words to so many hymns and songs), swim, ride horses and boats, and she had an interest in trains, dolls and hats. She will always be remembered for her cute hats. She had a very bubbly personality and she loved to interact with friends and family with her witty sayings. "Joyce, you are missed dearly. You left a good impression with everyone you met. We love you and we'll be seeing you again."

Joyce is survived by her mother, Eunice Quade McKinley, of Kalispell; her brothers, Aaron Quade and his wife, Yvonne, of Kalispell, and Mark McKinley and his wife, Linda, of Columbia Falls; and her sisters, Judy Quade of Issaquah, Wash., and Alice Neddo of Kalispell. Pauline Ethel (McCauley) Quam, 88, passed away Aug. 9, 2004, at Heritage Place in Kalispell.

She was born Dec. 27, 1915, in a sod shack near Westby, a daughter of William and Ethel May (Curle) McCauley. Her parents separated when she was a very young girl. In 1924, she and her younger brother, Morley, went to live with their older sister, Blanche, and her husband, Duncan McPhedran, in Snowden, Saskatchewan. She stayed there, attending elementary school, until she was 15 years old. Then she moved to the farm of another sister, Hilda, and her husband, Henry Oksa, near Westby. She finished school and worked on the farm there.

On Jan. 6, 1934, she married Leonard Quam. She lived in poverty in the "dusty '30s" and was amazed that she moved to see television and a man walking on the moon.

They leased land for farming and raising cattle in several locations around Westby. They discontinued farming and moved into the city of Westby in 1949, where they owned a cafe for a year, and a mobile home court and motel for several other years.

Pauline enjoyed keeping the property clean and well kept. They retired after selling the business and lived in a small home in Westby for several more years.

Pauline had a stroke in 1991 and had to move to Kalispell to be cared for by a daughter, Elaine, and son-in-law, Earl Strand. Her granddaughter, Teri Strand Beatty and husband, Wayne, and family also helped care for her since her stroke.



She lived with the Beattys for two and half years, with Elaine for a year or so, at Glacier Manor, the Friendship House, and Wel-Life Assisted Living. In April of this year, she moved to the Heritage Place Nursing Home.

She enjoyed writing poetry, making scrapbooks, exercising and playing cards with friends. She enjoyed playing the bells for the Bible study group at Wel-Life. She loved music and enjoyed dancing.

She was a good friend who liked to send cards, letters and to keep in touch with family. She was devoted to her family and did a great job baking goodies for the cafe they owned.

Pauline is survived by two daughters and sons-in-law, Elaine and Earl Strand of Kalispell, and Joyce and Herb Eby of Kennewick, Wash.; nine grandchildren, Tim and Todd Strand, Teri Beatty, Russell and Robert Westphal, Cindy Thompson, Debbie McClary, Kathy Graham and Francesca Borquez; 18 great-grandchildren; and one great-great-grandchild.
