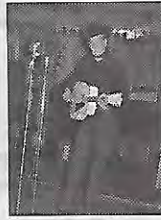

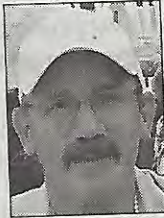

A celebration of his life will be held at 4 p.m. Monday, Sept. 17, 2018 at VFW #276 in Whitefish.

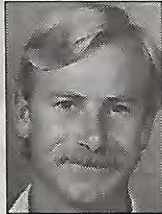
